Special Presentations Highlight Black History Month Celebration

In front of a packed gymnasium on Feb. 26 at the Eisenhower Community Center, Bellwood residents celebrated African-American history and witnessed special presentations to retiring Mayor Frank A. Pasquale and Clerk Lena M. Moreland.

In addition to musical, dance and spoken word performances, elected officials, including Cong. Danny Davis, Sen. Kimberly Lightford and Cook County Circuit Court Clerk Dorothy Brown, congratulated and thanked the mayor and clerk with proclamations, plaques and other gifts. Letters of recognition from Sen. Dick Durbin also were presented along with a proclamation from Cook County Recorder of Deeds Karen Yarbrough.

Rep. Chris Welch and Rep. Kathleen Willis surprised the mayor by announcing that the new 25th Avenue bridge will be renamed after him in recognition of bringing the project to reality.

Performances included those by students from Freedom Baptist Church; Proviso West Interpretive Praise Dancers; Lincoln, MECA Elementary, McKinley, Thurgood Marshall and Grant schools; the Roosevelt Middle School Combined Band and the Memorial Park Spartans Dance Team. A video presentation highlighted the history-making legacy of former President Barack Obama and the mayor and clerk.

Along with the mayor, the Board of Trustees acts as the village's corporate authorities and exercise municipal powers that have not been specifically delegated to another office or board. Bellwood's six trustees form the legislative body. They are elected from the village at large to four-year terms. Each of the current six trustees are being featured in the Update.

Arkansas native and 14-year Bellwood Trustee MC Robinson demonstrates the same passion today for the village as he did when first elected in 2003 as evident in his roles around the village. He is a member of the Advisory Council of Age Options and since 1992 has served on the board of the Bellwood Neighborhood Watch Scholarship Fund. He is a strong supporter of the Police department and the Community Policing program, and has been a block watch captain since 1985.

The certified tool and die maker was elected for 20 consecutive years by his co-workers as chairman of the International Association of Machinists & Aerospace Union. Commonly known as the "people's trustee," Robinson is a familiar face around town and connects with residents at village and Memorial Park District events.

To apply you must meet the following requirements:

- You must be a **BELLWOOD** resident
- You must be 14 – 16 years of age

To be considered you must return the **completed** application along with the following items:

- A **copy** of your Birth Certificate
- A **copy** of your Social Security Card
- A **current** Water Bill with your mother/father/legal guardian's name on the bill
- A **signed** Work Permit by the student/parent/legal guardian and an authorized official

Work permits for students 14-15 years old should be taken by the student and/or parent/legal guardian to be processed by an authorized official at Proviso West High School Office (main office) between April 24 – 27 and May 1 - 4 from 9:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

All completed applications and the required documents must be returned to the Village Clerk's Office no later than Friday, May 5th by 5:00 p.m.
