The meeting included recruiting residents for one of the eight priority areas: Connectivity, Green Generation, Health and Well-Being, Infrastructure, Place, Prosperity, Resource Regeneration and Support.

Using feedback from both sessions, along with selecting a table representative to vote on their behalf and a point system, important ideas and suggestions were made. Wynton Jones, M.B.A., director of Sustainability for Urban Efficiency Group, one of the C4 partners, helped facilitate the meeting. The next steps in the Roadmap Development Process for the village include:

- Continuing to Part B, which is the Qualitative Analysis
- Recruiting Subcommittee members for each priority
- Connecting with the Chicago Wilderness Alliance to discuss and plan for a community-engaged asset mapping session
- Creating a survey to continuously drive community feedback and to further socialize the work

## Neighborhood Watch Meeting Focuses on Domestic Violence

The October Neighborhood Watch meeting featured a presentation on domestic violence from Liz and Julia of Sarah's Inn. Founded in 1980, Sarah's Inn has grown to be one of the most comprehensive domestic violence agencies serving Chicago and the western suburbs.




The agency's mission is to improve the lives of those affected by domestic violence and to break the cycle of violence for future generations. Sarah's Inn has three core program areas that serves more than 23,000 people annually:

- The Intervention Program provides supportive services for families affected by domestic violence to safely navigate crises, effectively process trauma and establish self-sufficiency.
- The Together Strong Project provides school-based violence prevention education programming for youth.
- The Training and Education Program maximizes reach by creating a network of skilled bystanders to appropriately intervene as first responders and community advocates.
